Government Grant Scams

- The government won't get in touch out of the blue about grants. It won't call, text, reach out through social media, or email you. It won't offer you free government grants of any kind, much less grants to pay for home repairs, medical costs, or other personal needs. Real government grants require an application, and they're always for a very specific purpose. Learn more (for free) at grants.gov.
- Never share your financial or personal information with anyone who contacts you. Government agencies will never call, text, message you on social media, or email to ask for your Social Security, bank account, or credit card number. In fact, no matter who they say they are, don't give out that information. Once a scammer has your information, they can steal money from your account, or your identity.
- Don't pay for a list of government grants and don't pay any up-front fees. The only place you can find a list of all available federal grants is at grants.gov. And that list is free. No government agency will ever contact you to demand that you pay to get a grant. And no government agency will ever ask you to pay with a gift card, cash reload card, by money transfer, or with cryptocurrency. Not for a grant, and not ever.
- If you paid a scammer, act quickly. If you think you've sent money to a government impersonator like one of these grant scammers, contact the company you used to send the money. Tell the gift card, money transfer, or cryptocurrency company that it was a fraudulent transaction. Then ask them to reverse it.

Grants.Gov

Using the <u>Grants.gov</u> system makes it faster, easier and more cost effective for grant applicants to electronically interact with federal grant-making agencies. It also provides the following key benefits, among many others, to the grant community. The grant process encompasses a lot of steps that are completed by different groups. Below is a checklist of the main steps in this process with links to more detailed information on each one.

- Familiarize yourself with the overall <u>Grants Lifecyle</u>.
- <u>Determining your eligibility</u> for funding on Grants.gov.
- Identify the right types of funding opportunities for you.
- Learn about the <u>reporting requirements</u> you will need to comply with if awarded funding.
- <u>Search for</u> the specific grant you will apply for.
- Confirm that you are <u>eligible</u> to apply for that grant.
- <u>Register</u> with Grant.gov.
- <u>Apply</u> for the grant

Section 508.gov

Section508.gov provides guidance to Federal agency staff who play a role in IT accessibility.

Digital.gov

The mission of <u>Digital.gov</u> is to transform how government learns, builds, delivers, and measures digital services. They do this by providing people in the federal government with the tools, methods, practices, and policy guidance they need to deliver effective and accessible digital services.

Plainlanguage.gov

The <u>Plain Language Action and Information Network</u> (PLAIN) is an unfunded working group of federal employees from different agencies and specialties who support the use of clear communication in government writing.

Logic Model

A <u>logic model</u> is a graphic depiction (road map) that presents the shared relationships among the resources, activities, outputs, and outcomes/impacts for your program.

Tearless Logic Model

<u>Developing a program logic model</u> assists program staff and other stakeholders in defining the goals of a project and develops a road map for getting to the goals. The logic model is also used during the evaluation process to measure progress toward the program goals. To facilitate the creation of the logic model, community-based organizations can consider using the Tearless Logic Model.

Health Resources and Services Administration

Completing a grant application can take 40 hours or more. The <u>Health Resources and Services</u> <u>Administration</u> (HRSA) can help you navigate the process.
