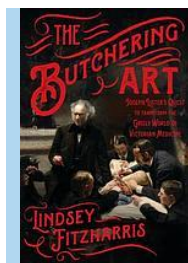

Summary

A dramatic account of how 19th-century Quaker surgeon Joseph Lister developed an antiseptic method that indelibly changed medicine. The story describes the practices and risks of early operating theaters as well as the belief systems of Lister's contemporaries.

Questions

1. How did Lister's upbringing influence his career?
2. What did you learn about the practice of medicine during this period of history that you did not previously know? What was most surprising or shocking?
3. Antiseptic treatment is common practice today, so why was Lister not immediately praised for his discovery? How did the use of anesthesia have a reverse or incongruent result in the operating room?
4. How did Lister's ad hoc abscess drain invention save Queen Victoria's life?
5. Medicine has been categorized as both an art and a science. Do you agree? Why or why not?
6. What are some of the ethical, moral, or social implications for practicing medicine that are discussed in the story? Did the book change your opinion or view of the practice of medicine? How so?
7. Why do you think the author chose *The Butchering Art* for the book title?
8. Describing medicine in a way that is understandable and enjoyable to read can be challenging. Did the author accomplish this? How so?
