
## **Discussion Guide**

## **Summary**


A doctor's memoir about his father's experience of dementia and an overview of the history of and latest findings on the disease.

## Questions

- 1. In the Introduction, Jauhar quotes a physician calling Alzheimer's the worst of all diseases. Do you agree?
- 2. Jauhar writes about his father: "I loved him, cared for him, and hated him, too." What was your response to his candid self-assessment?
- 3. Does it surprise you that Jauhar, despite his medical training, claims that that the beginning of his father's illness he knew little about dementia?
- 4. Jauhar describes a "hypercognitive" bias in Western society that socially marginalizes people living with dementia. What are some examples of this prejudice in your own life?
- 5. What are some aspects of American life that make it so difficult to care for elders with dementia? What can be done to relieve caregiver burden?
- 6. Jauhar wades into the ethics of "therapeutic deception" in caring for his father. Do you think lying is a morally defensible caregiving strategy?
- 7. Jauhar details numerous scenes in which he loses patience with his father. What was your reaction to these experiences?
- 8. Jauhar struggles with following his father's advance directive because his father doesn't seem unhappy in his declining state. Do you think that was a valid response?
- 9. Jauhar describes a tension between his different roles as a son, father, spouse, and professional. How does this tension play out in your own life?
- 10. *My Father's Brain* blends memoir with science writing. Why do you think Jauhar includes science in such a personal book?
- 11. Jauhar writes that once his father was labeled as having a brain disease, "he became to me a minor character in our family, a miniaturized version of his former self, isolated and confined to ever-shrinking boundaries, as I stared sadly at him from outside the cage." What was your response to this statement?
- 12. Both of Jauhar's parents had degenerative brain diseases. Why do you think he chose to write mostly about his father?



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- 13. In his family, Jauhar alone seems adamantly opposed to putting his father in a nursing home. What was your reaction to this? Are there situations in which a person with dementia would be better off going to a nursing home?
- 14. Jauhar writes of memory construction to reconcile the past with your feelings in the present. What are some examples of this principle in your own life?
- 15. Jauhar describes competing perspectives on the meaning of personhood. What are your thoughts on how to define a person?
- 16. Jauhar describes a scene at a day program for dementia patients in which his father is given a stuffed animal and otherwise treated like a child. What are some ways such outpatient programs could be improved?
- 17. The book is full of antiheroic moments. Is there a hero in the book?
